Adjective synonyms

Aim

To learn and practice adjective synonyms.

Preparation

Make one copy of the two-page worksheet for each student.

Level

Intermediate (B1)

Time

25 minutes

Introduction

In this adjectives worksheet, students learn and practice adjective synonyms.

Procedure

Give each student a copy of the two-page worksheet.

Students start by reading a story and matching adjectives in bold with their synonyms.

Exercise A - Answer key
