

# **Activity Type**

Grammar and Speaking Game: matching, forming sentences from prompts, controlled practice (group work)

#### **Focus**

Clauses of manner

'As if' and 'as though'

### **Aim**

To practice using 'as if' and 'as though' with the present simple and present continuous to describe situations that appear to be true.

# **Preparation**

Make one copy of the two sets of cards for each group of three and cut as indicated. Keep the situation cards and the sentence prompt cards separate.

#### Level

Upper-intermediate (B2)

#### Time

25 minutes

## Introduction

In this 'as if' and 'as though' game, students practice forming sentences using 'as if' and 'as though' with the present simple and present continuous.

## **Procedure**

Divide the class into groups of three.

Give each group a set of situation cards and a set of sentence prompt cards.

Ask the students to shuffle the two sets of cards and then deal out all the sentence prompt cards evenly and put the situation cards face down in a pile on the table.

The first student turns over the top situation card, reads it to the group, and then lays it face up on the table.

Next, all the students look at their cards and try to find the matching sentence prompt.

The student with the matching card then uses the prompt to make an 'as if' or 'as though' sentence that refers to the situation, e.g. for the situation 'You're ready to leave for work, but your car won't start', the matching prompt would be 'It seems as if the battery is dead.'

If everyone in the group agrees that the sentence corresponds to the situation and is grammatically correct, the two cards are removed from the game.

If the sentence isn't grammatically correct, the situation card is placed at the bottom of the pile.

If the sentence doesn't correspond to the situation, another student can try to answer.

If students are unsure, they can ask you to adjudicate.

The second student then turns over the next situation card from the pile, and so on.

The first student to get rid of all their sentence prompt cards wins the game.

Afterwards, check the answers by eliciting the matching card for each situation and the corresponding 'as if' or 'as though' sentence.
