Grammar Exercises: gapfill, rewriting sentences, writing sentences from prompts

Focus

Causative verbs

Aim

To learn and practice the causative verbs *have*, *make*, *get* and *let*.

Preparation

Make one copy of the two-page worksheet for each student.

Level

Intermediate (B1)

Time

30 minutes

Introduction

In this causative verbs worksheet, students learn and practice the four commonly used causative verbs *have*, *make*, *get* and *let*.

Procedure

Give each student a copy of the two-page worksheet.

Read the introduction about causative verbs together as a class.

Students then complete sentences with causative verbs *have*, *make*, *get*, or *let* and the verbs in brackets, changing verb forms as needed.

Exercise A - Answer key

letting, go
made, tell
had, do
got, to check
let, come
got, to clean
had, write

Next, students use the sentences from Exercise A to help them complete verb definitions with the causative verbs: *have*, *make*, *get*, or *let*.

Exercise B - Answer key

1. let 2. make 3. get 4. have

Students then move on to rewrite sentences, adding in a causative verb: *have*, *make*, *get* or *let*.

Exercise C - Answer key (wording may vary)

- 1. My sister let me use her computer.
- 2. I usually get my husband to do the cooking.
- 3. Since he lives alone, I make my son call me when he gets home.
- 4. I have a gardener cut the grass and maintain the garden.
- 5. My friend lets me use the gym for free.
- 6. I hate driving so I make my husband drive when we're together.

Afterwards, students write sentences about their lives with causative verbs.

Students can write about what they are allowed to do, forced to do, persuaded to do, authorized to do, etc.

Finally, students read and discuss their sentences with a partner. When the students have finished, review their sentences as a class.



Causative verbs are used when a subject causes an action to happen, but didn't do the action themselves (someone else did the action for them).

Causative verb sentence structure:

Subject + causative verb + agent + base verb or infinitive + object

The agent is the person or thing doing the action

Example: I made my friend teach me English.

Four common causative verbs are: have, make, get and let.



A. Complete each sentence with a causative verb (have, make, get, or let) and the verb in brackets. You may need to change the form of the verbs.
