Has got

Aim

To ask and answer questions with 'have got' and write sentences with 'has got'.

Preparation

Make one copy of the worksheet for each student.

Level

Elementary

Time

35 minutes

Introduction

Here is an insightful worksheet activity to help teach students how to ask and answer questions with 'have got' and write sentences with 'has got'.

Procedure

Give each student a copy of the worksheet.

Tell the students that they are going to practice asking and answering questions with 'have got'.

Go through the items on the worksheet and have the students form a 'Have you got...?' question for each one.

Next, ask the students to write three more questions of their own at the bottom of the worksheet to make the questionnaire more personal.

When the students have finished, they go around the classroom asking the questions to one another, e.g. 'Have you got an older sister?'

When a student finds someone who answers 'Yes, I have', they write down that person's name next to the item.

The student then asks a follow-up question (e.g. 'What's her name?') and writes the answer in the last column.

It is important to tell the students that they can only have the same name once (or twice). This is to encourage the students to speak to as many different partners as possible.

When everyone has finished, have the students write sentences about what they found out using 'has got', e.g. 'Emily has got an older sister. Her name is Abbey'.

Students then report back to the class by reading their sentences aloud. Any interesting findings can be discussed in more detail.
