Language Focus

Making suggestions

Accepting and rejecting suggestions

Aim

To learn how to make, accept and reject suggestions.

Preparation

Make one copy of the lesson for each student.

Level

Pre-intermediate (A2)

Time

60 minutes

Introduction

In this engaging topic-based lesson, students learn how to make, accept and reject suggestions.

Procedure

Students begin by looking at pictures of eight presents and writing the names of the presents below the pictures.

Exercise A - Answer key

a watch, socks, a book, a birthday cake, a tie, tickets for a football match, headphones, a camera.

After the answers have been checked, students rank the presents from the most to the least expensive.

The students then answer questions about which present they would most and least like to receive for their birthday and which would be the best and worst present for their dad.

Afterwards, get feedback on the students' answers.

Students then complete a gap-fill dialogue where two people are suggesting presents for their dad's birthday.

Check the answers with the class and then have the students identify and write down the phrases used for making, accepting and rejecting suggestions from the dialogue.

Finally, the students create a conversation where they make, accept and reject suggestions for a friend's birthday present using a set of prompts together with the language they have learnt. Students then present their conversations to the class.
