Vocabulary Game: miming, guessing, sentence completion (group work)

Focus

Adjective-noun collocations

Aim

To guess missing adjective-noun collocations in sentences.

Preparation

Make one copy of the cards for each group of three or four and cut as indicated.

Level

Pre-intermediate (A2)

Time

25 minutes

Introduction

In this adjective-noun collocations game, students race to guess missing collocations in sentences.

Procedure

Divide the students into groups of three or four.

Give each group a set of cards.

Ask the students to shuffle the cards and place them face-down in a pile on the table.

Students take it in turns to pick up a card and read the sentence on the card using the word 'blank' for the missing adjective-noun collocation.

The other students then race to guess the missing adjective-noun collocation from the context of the sentence.

The first student to correctly guess the collocation wins and keeps the card.

If students are having difficulty guessing, the reader can mime the collocation to help the students get the right answer.

If nobody manages to guess the collocation, the answer is revealed and the card is removed from the game.

The student with the most cards at the end of the game wins.
